## **Franciscan Servants of the Holy Family**

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Dear family and friends, Peace and All Good!

Each year as Christmas approaches, we locate the tubs and boxes where all the items of Christmas have been resting since the previous year. Along with the lights, wreaths, candles, the tree and its ornaments of all sorts, hopefully there is, to be located in a place of prominence, the Nativity scene.

This scene invites us into understanding Jesus and the story of His birth. I so enjoy the endearing image, often witnessed in churches and other places when children, drawn to the Nativity scene, stand motionless, enthralled by the characters, the beauty, the mystery. When the parents catch up, there unfolds a quiet conversation, a teaching moment, a moment of evangelization.

It seems appropriate to share a bit of the history of the first Living Nativity scene. Since Jesus' birth over 2 millennia ago, artists have depicted the scene of His birth, in paintings in the churches of Rome, etc. But it wasn't until 1223 AD (800 years ago) that St. Francis of Assisi re-enacted the scene, the first Living Nativity on Christmas eve.

So much did St. Francis love Jesus, that he asked a friend to gather some animals among the caves of Greccio (Italy). According to Thomas of Celano, the first biographer of St. Francis, "... friars came to Greccio from various parts, together with people from the farmsteads in the area, who brought flowers and torches to light up that holy night. When Francis arrived, he found a manger full of hay, an ox and a donkey. All those present experienced a new and indescribable joy in the presence of the Christmas scene. The priest then solemnly celebrated the Eucharist over the manger, showing the bond between the Incarnation of the Son of God and the Eucharist... this scene was accompanied by the gift of a



marvelous vision: one of those present saw the Baby Jesus himself lying in the manger." Although St. Francis wasn't physically present at Jesus' birth, this depiction of St. Francis holding the Baby Jesus expresses his loving, profound connection with the poor and humble Christ Child.

Pope Francis, in his 2019 Apostolic Letter Admirabile signum (enchanting image) says,

'The nativity scene is like a living Gospel rising up from the pages of sacred Scripture. As we contemplate the Christmas story, we are invited to set out on a spiritual journey, drawn by the humility of the God who became human in order to encounter every man and woman. We come to realize that so great is his love for us that he became one of us, so that we in turn might become one with him."



Every Nativity scene has a story and a way of teaching. The one above holds my first image of Jesus' birth. Having been purchased by our parents a piece or two at a time, these small painted plaster pieces, a few with price tags still attached (5 and 10 cents ea.) somehow survived the young hands of my siblings and I as we arranged and rearranged them throughout the Christmas Season. We made sure the kings arrived from the East, the animals were all gazing at the baby. The cardboard stable has even survived 6+ decades. What a joy to gaze on it and receive the story it tells!

The past months have had a steady, busy pace with ministry with the Secular Franciscans and spiritual mentorship, directing a Women's Retreat in October, and ministering to moms who come to St. Mary's Home for Mothers. These moms come to us single, pregnant, homeless, in need of a safe and loving environment. In November, I was a co-presenter at the Alliance for Life (MO) Conference in KC on the topic of Seeking Safety, one of the therapies used with the moms at St. Mary's Home.

Family reunions and weddings were numerous this summer/fall, which were great times to re-unite with many family members and friends.
